# **YOUTH SERVICES**

### Our Commitment to Education and Professional Development

CRCD is committed to providing educational opportunities and career pathways to our youth. We know that education is the foundation for personal and professional development for youth and we strive to create more opportunities. Our goal is to ensure that our program participants receive a high-quality education that will help them access career opportunities that align with their interests. Community participants can achieve their goals through our programs, like South LA YouthBuild, CRCD Academy and LA: Rise Youth Community. Through these programs, CRCD provides transition-aged youth and individuals between ages 16 and 24 the opportunities to earn their high school diploma, earn college credits, build their professional skills, and expand their professional network.

### CRCD Partners with AT&T to Donate over 900 Backpacks

In 2022, CRCD formed a significant partnership with AT&T to establish the first Connected Learning Center in South LA, an initiative to bridge the digital divide and enhance educational opportunities for our community's youth. Building on this partnership, in 2023, we joined forces with AT&T again to donate over 900 backpacks filled with essential school supplies to local students preparing for the new school year.

The distribution event was a community effort, with contributions from Councilman Curren Price, Jr. and South LA YouthBuild. It took place at our VCN YouthSource Center, where these fully equipped backpacks were handed out, providing vital resources to support students' educational journeys in South LA. This initiative is part of our ongoing commitment to support our community youth's academic success and well-being.

CRCD is the lead agency for the South LA YouthBuild and AmeriCorps programs. The South LA YouthBuild program enables youth aged 16 to 24 to earn their high school diploma. We collaborate with these young individuals to develop the skills and mindsets necessary for lifelong learning, employment, and leadership while treating them with dignity and respect. AmeriCorps members gain unique opportunities for community service and can earn educational awards and scholarships. CRCD offers comprehensive support, including intensive case management, support services, leadership development, career placement services, and follow-up support to ensure continued success.

### Jobs for Los Angeles Graduates: JLAG

Jobs for Los Angeles Graduates (JLAG) is part of the national Jobs for America's Graduates (JAG) network, dedicated to serving youth aged 16 to 24 facing inschool or out-of-school barriers. JLAG's primary mission is to offer a pathway to success and employment through comprehensive counseling, employability and technical skills development, professional networking, career development, and job placement services. These efforts aim to secure quality jobs leading to careers after graduation and facilitate enrollment in postsecondary education and certification training programs.

### 2023 CRCD Academy Graduation

CRCD was excited to host a graduation ceremony for our 2023 Academy graduates. CRCD Academy is a partnership between CRCD, Los Angeles Trade-Technical College, and YouthBuild Charter School of California that offers individuals between the ages of 16 and 24 an expedited alternative to earning an accredited high school diploma. The academy embeds project-based learning, community service, leadership, and career preparation into the program curriculum to enhance students' professional development while they receive their education.

For the past three years, the ceremony has taken place at the Los Angeles Trade-Technical College (LATTC). Graduates were joined by supportive friends, family, teachers, and mentors to acknowledge their perseverance.

## **WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT**

### Our Commitment to Providing Pathways to Economic Stability

CRCD's Workforce Development Department is designed to empower South Los Angeles residents with education and skill-building opportunities. As the lead agency operating the Vernon-Central/LATTC WorkSource Center, we have established partnerships with local agencies and educational institutions to offer program participants various resources, such as career coaching, job placement assistance, and vocational training. These individuals gain hands-on experience and specialized knowledge training tailored to industry needs.

### Multi-Craft Core Curriculum Training (MC3)

We are proud to offer the Multi-Craft Core Curriculum (MC3) Apprenticeship Readiness Training in partnership with the LA/OC Building and Construction Trades Council Apprenticeship Readiness Fund. This initiative offers paid construction apprenticeships, allowing participants to gain hands-on experience while building valuable connections with local trade unions after graduation. These relationships are instrumental as participants move on to work on CRCD developments or other projects in our community. We are pleased to announce that the program received increased funding last year, enhancing our capacity to support more participants.

On September 29, 2023, CRCD proudly inaugurated the **Tresa McCoy Regional Training Center** in honor of Tresa McCoy, an important figure in the South Los Angeles community, particularly known for her dedication to workforce development and education. She was deeply involved in CRCD's work and was a leader and advocate for youth and community development programs. Her legacy is honored through the Tresa McCoy Training Center. This state-of-the-art facility functions as the primary hub for a variety of certifications, including our MC3, Certified Apartment Maintenance Technician (CAMT), Occupational Health and Safety Administration (OSHA) 10, CPR/First Aid, Lead Abatement, and HBI Pre-Apprenticeship Certificate (PACT) training programs. Upon completing these programs, participants receive comprehensive support from our Career Coaches and Job Developers. This support includes resume and interview preparation, employment networking, and financial education services designed to enhance participants' prospects for longterm employment and economic stability. We aim to empower individuals with the skills and resources needed to thrive in the workforce through these efforts.

CRCD's Workforce Development for Adults hosted over **30** job fairs at the Vernon-Central/LATTC WorkSource Center, bringing in over **100** employers to meet with out-of-work individuals in the community.

### **Opportunity Wednesdays**

Our Opportunity Wednesdays help bridge the employment gap for job seekers who rarely get to speak directly to employers. We hosted employers looking for job-ready candidates to join their teams from a variety of employment sectors, such as hospitality, construction, events, transportation, and many more.

CRCD collaborates with the American Job Centers network and the City of Los Angeles Economic & Workforce Development Department to host Opportunity Wednesdays at the Vernon-Central/LATTC WorkSource Center. At the center, we offer one-on-one career coaching, workforce readiness, financial coaching, entrepreneur training, and other support services.

#### **CRCD Provides Lead Abatement Training**

We enriched our workforce development curriculum in 2023 by integrating Lead Abatement Training. The Los Angeles County Development Authority awarded a substantial grant of \$5.7 million to enhance the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health's Lead-Free Homes LA Program across the county. This initiative aims to eliminate lead-based paint and other lead hazards from interior and exterior residential areas while addressing damage. Through our expanded training efforts, we are committed to equipping many Angelenos with the skills necessary to remove these health risks safely. Our goal is to mitigate the disproportionate impact of lead exposure in disenfranchised communities throughout Los Angeles, ensuring safer living environments for all residents while providing our trainees with career pathways for living wages.

# **HOUSING AND SUPPORT SERVICES**

### Our Commitment to Providing Accessibility to Housing

CRCD is dedicated to tackling the issue of youth homelessness in South Los Angeles. We strive to provide comprehensive housing solutions for individuals and families experiencing homelessness, including access to temporary shelters and permanent supportive housing. To foster long-term stability, CRCD provides a range of support services, including financial education, job skills training, and mental health care. These initiatives empower our community members and support their journey toward a stable and independent future.

### Ruth's Place Grand Re-Opening

We proudly announced the grand re-opening of Ruth's Place, a youth drop-in center. Ruth's Place has been a safe space for our community's youth and young adults between the ages of 18 and 24 who are at risk of becoming homeless or are homeless. The center provides food, showers, clothing, transportation support, access to support services, and transition and permanent housing placements.

#### LAHSA'S 2023 Homeless Youth Count

CRCD participated in the 2023 Homeless Youth Count as the Regional Planner for the Youth Coordinated Entry System in Service Planning Area (SPA) 6. Our role leverages our expertise in supporting youth at risk of homelessness or currently without homes. We are dedicated to offering comprehensive support services that improve access to housing and promote long-term stability for these young individuals. Our coordinated efforts aim to empower homeless youth with the tools and resources necessary for a secure and stable future. We completed over **700** census tracts, trained **300** people, approached **800** respondents, and distributed **430** gift cards throughout SPAs 1-8 in Los Angeles County.

## SOUTHEAST LA BUSINESSSOURCE CENTER

#### Our Commitment to Entrepreneurship and Small Businesses

CRCD is committed to empowering South Los Angeles entrepreneurs and small business owners. Our BusinessSource Center provides free and cost-effective tools to help businesses succeed. Small businesses can use these tools to grow and be competitive within the City of Los Angeles. To ensure long-term success for our participants, we provide various services like one-on-one consulting, business courses, employee hiring and workforce development, tax incentives and credits, and an Entrepreneur Training Program.

#### **Business Collaborative Breakfast**

The Southeast LA BusinessSource Center hosted a Business Collaborative Breakfast at the Vernon-Central/LATTC WorkSource Center, welcoming a diverse group of manufacturing industry business owners and experts. Special panelists included Mark Morales from City National Bank, Linda **Rosenberg from California Manufacturing** Technology Consulting (CMTC), and Jack Ochoa from Regional Alliance Marketplace for Procurement (RAMP LA). They shared their expertise on Small Business Administration (SBA) loan programs, CMTC services, and available certifications for small business owners. promising to enhance the living conditions and support the well-being of its future residents.

# 212 small businesses served

\$584,577 in loans funded The Southeast Los Angeles BusinessSource Center, powered by CRCD, awarded over **15** small business owners the first-ever Best Start Region 2 Entrepreneurship Training Series Certification, and they each received \$1,000 in start-up funds for their businesses.

# **REAL ESTATE DEVELOPMENT**

### How We Change Lives One Home at a Time

Since 2007, CRCD has been at the forefront of addressing housing needs in South LA by collaborating with local organizations to develop affordable and permanent supportive housing. CRCD Partners oversees these developments, which come equipped with essential on-site support services provided by CRCD's ecosystem and partners for transition-age youth, families, homeless veterans, and other low-income residents.

To date, we proudly own and operate 14 housing developments, which provide 464 units of affordable and permanent supportive housing. Looking to the future, we are actively expanding our efforts and are adding 217 more new units in 2024 and 228 in 2025. This expansion aims to significantly enhance housing accessibility for residents of South LA, furthering our commitment to supporting our community through improved living conditions and comprehensive support services.

### 'Topping Off' Evermont

In 2023, CRCD proudly celebrated a significant milestone with the 'Topping Off' ceremony for the Evermont development, signaling the project's achievement of placing the final and highest beam. This important event was conducted with LA County Supervisor Holly J. Mitchell and LA City Councilman Marqueece Harris-Dawson, and our development partners, BRIDGE Housing and Primestor Development.

The Evermont development is set to provide 180 affordable housing units specifically designed to accommodate families and seniors. Importantly, this project includes units earmarked for transition-age youth with children and unhoused seniors, addressing crucial needs within our community. This community will also include commercial and retail spaces including a SEED school, a transit plaza, and a Metro training facility. The completion of the Evermont development is eagerly anticipated for the fourth quarter of 2024, promising to enhance the living conditions and support the well-being of its future residents.

## **SOUTH LA ALL IN**

### Together we are "All In" for South LA!

After a multi-year, community-driven planning process, CRCD proudly launched South LA All In (SLAAI), a coalition-driven initiative committed to addressing longstanding socio-economic disparities in South Los Angeles. SLAAI will ensure that residents, local businesses, CBOs, and other stakeholders are well-prepared to benefit from significant infrastructure and community development leading to the 2028 Olympics. Our mission is twofold:

- 1. Ensure a just and equitable recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic, recognizing the unique vulnerabilities of South LA and the disproportionate impacts of the crisis on this area.
- 2. Empower residents and local businesses to benefit from the investments and development opportunities allocated as Los Angeles prepares to host the 2028 Olympics.

SLAAI focuses on the historically underinvested communities in the corridor between Interstate 110 and Alameda Street, from Vernon-Central to Compton. This initiative fosters a sustainable and inclusive economic environment that benefits all community members.

### **CD 9 Community Grants Program**

CRCD was selected as the Grant Administrator for the City of Los Angeles Council District 9 (CD 9) Community Grants Program, initiated by Councilmember Curren D. Price. Jr.

The first-of-its-kind Community Grants Program distributed a total of \$4.5 million to 91 communitybased organizations and projects serving Council District 9 in the areas of youth development, reentry, jobs and economic development, homelessness, community resources, health and wellness, and the arts.

### South LA Strong Nonprofit Conference

### **Community Development Index**

This strategic tool assesses four priority areas—Housing Stability and Affordability, Access to Capital, Good Jobs, and Education using specific metrics:

### SLAAI's "Meeting of the Minds" Symposium

SLAAI hosted the "Meeting of the Minds" Symposium in South Los Angeles, a gathering that united leaders, stakeholders, and community members to foster inspiration, collaboration, and catalyze change. The symposium addressed various critical topics, including the landscape of South LA in the post-COVID 19 era, approaches to equitable and intentional community development, the opportunities brought forth by the 2028 Olympics, and the various economic development opportunities currently available.

- 1. Housing Stability and Affordability: Rates of homelessness, overcrowded housing, and severe rent burden.
- 2. Access to Capital: Mortgage approval rates, average small business loan amounts, and homeownership rates.
- 3. Good Jobs: Local unemployment rates, job-worker ratios, and median worker earnings.
- 4. **Education:** Postsecondary graduation rates, proportion of opportunity youth, and college enrollment.

These metrics, accompanied by comprehensive community level data, are aggregated to produce a community development score ranging from 1 to 10 for each neighborhood, providing a clear, actionable indicator for targeting resources and efforts to enhance sustainable growth.

## **OUR 2023 HONORS**

The Coalition for Responsible Community Development has been honored with the following recognitions:

- The Los Angeles Better Buildings Challenge awarded CRCD the Innovator of the Year Community Impact Award for its dedication to affordable housing and community development in South LA.
- Assemblymember Reggie Jones-Sawyer presented a \$35 million check from the State of California to the <u>South LA Eco-Lab Collaborative</u> partners at the Tresa McCoy Regional Training Center, home of the South LA Infrastructure Academy as the workforce development partner in the South LA Eco-Lab.
- The California Department of Financial Protection and Innovation awarded CRCD \$172,742 as part of their <u>#CalMoneySmart program</u> to continue providing financial literacy training to the South LA community.
- CRCD received \$75,000 from the <u>National Trust for Historic Preservation African American</u> <u>Cultural Heritage Action Fund</u> to advance the ongoing preservation of the Historic South LA Lincoln Theater.




