



Celebrating the Success of the MC3 Apprenticeship Readiness Training Program

We are proud to highlight the continued success of our Multi-Craft Core Curriculum Apprenticeship Readiness Training Program (MC3). Under the umbrella of the LA/OC Building and Construction Trades Council Apprenticeship Readiness Fund, MC3 prepares participants for Union Apprenticeship in one of the 14 trades under the LA/OC Building and Construction Trades Council. CRCD is proud to partner with the LA/OC Apprenticeship Readiness Fund to offer life-long, Union career pathways in the Building and Construction trades to South LA residents and contribute to a stronger Los Angeles!

Success Story: James Brown's Journey to a Stable Career

James Brown, a former foster youth at risk of homelessness, came to CRCD through the Vernon-Central/LATTC WorkSource Center seeking a stable career. With truck driving experience and a Class A License, he joined the MC3 Apprenticeship Readiness Training program, where he demonstrated dedication and leadership. Despite financial struggles for license fees and mandatory training, CRCD covered these costs and provided gas cards for travel. James completed the Teamsters Training Program, was placed on the Ready to Work list, and was sponsored into Local 986 and started work with Griffith Construction Company, earning the "Caught In The Act" Safety Award at Los Angeles World Airports. Grateful for CRCD's support, James now aims to inspire new trainees and help others find success in the trades.

Project Tipping Point Program Expands Reach

CRCD strengthened its commitment to foster youth by formalizing a partnership with Compton College, expanding access to post-secondary education and supportive services for current and former foster youth. Through sustained outreach and engagement, the program secured 18 students, providing college navigation, academic support, and wraparound services to ensure their educational success. Our continuing partnership with Los Angeles Trade-Technical College and now with Compton College exemplify CRCD's commitment to expanding educational opportunities, enhancing student support systems, and building long-term collaborations that uplift foster youth.



CRCD Receives SoCalGas Community Investment Fund

With support from the 2024 SoCalGas Community Investment Fund (SCG CIF) grant, we are helping young adults (18-24) and adults explore career pathways, with a focus on clean energy and STEM jobs. This funding allows youth opportunities to work with CRCD career coaches to navigate their next steps, including education, training, and hands-on work experience.

AT&T Backpack Giveaway

CRCD highlighted its partnership with AT&T on August 1 with a Laptop and Backpack Giveaway, providing essential technology to South LA youth and helping to end the digital divide. AT&T also donated \$20,000 to support the South LA All In initiative, expanding digital access and opportunities. Together, we are advancing digital equity and empowering young people to succeed. We are grateful to AT&T and all our partners for their support.

CareerConnect Digital Ambassador Program Launch

On November 19, 2024, Los Angeles Mayor Karen Bass officially launched the CareerConnect Digital Ambassador program at the Vernon Central/LATTC WorkSource Center. This initiative was made possible through a grant from Comcast's Talent for Tomorrow: Digital Equity Challenge Award, in partnership with the U.S. Conference of Mayors.

The event brought together Mayor Bass, her staff, community members, Comcast representatives, and CRCD participants to celebrate a shared commitment to expanding digital access and workforce opportunity. The grant funded the addition of two Digital Ambassadors to the Job Connector team, who will provide participants with one-on-one support in building essential digital literacy skills—including training on Wi-Fi use, accessing hotspots, and navigating laptops and online platforms.

The program represents a significant investment in digital equity. CareerConnect is expanding its reach and capacity, with a fully staffed team in 2025, allowing the initiative to serve even more South LA residents. This marks a crucial step forward in bridging the digital divide and enhancing career readiness in underserved communities.

Supporting Successful Reentry: CRCD's Commitment to Workforce Reintegration

CRCD's Reentry Program provides critical support to individuals transitioning back into the workforce after incarceration. Through partnerships with organizations like CRCD Enterprises, the program offers hands-on training and work experience, helping participants build valuable skills for long-term employment. Additionally, CRCD connects participants with resources such as career coaching, educational opportunities, and job placement assistance. In 2024, the program enrolled 26 individuals in its Warm Hand-Off initiative, supporting them in overcoming barriers to employment and stability. With a focus on professional development, the program also celebrated several participants' achievements at events like the East Los Angeles College Certificate Ceremony.

HOUSING AND SUPPORT SERVICES

Expanding Permanent Supporting Housing Solutions

In 2024, CRCD made significant strides in providing permanent supportive housing (PSH) and support services for individuals and families in South LA who have experienced housing insecurity. Three new PSH locations—La Prensa Libre, Marcella Gardens, and Ruth Teague Homes—opened to provide adults, families, transition-aged youth (TAY), and veterans stable housing and in-house services including Intensive Case Management Services (ICMS), connection to CRCD’s Workforce Development team and mental health support from Alcott Center for Mental Health Services.

Program Achievements and Expansions

- **Skid Row Action Plan:** In June, we expanded services with 88 additional slots to assist individuals in Skid Row experiencing the highest barriers to housing stability in Skid Row in collaboration with the Housing and Support Services Department (HSSD).
- **Hope Bridge Program:** We launched the program in July to support young people transitioning out of foster care. We have successfully housed 14 foster youth with ongoing case management.
- **Toy Drive:** In December, we distributed nearly 250 toys to 120 families across nine PSH locations, supported by donations from organizations like the Al-Barro Foundation, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, CHiPs For Kids, the Los Angeles Fire Department Spark of Love, the Kennan Ray Foundation, and South LA All In.
- **Permanent Supportive Housing Programs:** 343 households housed across Project Based Sites and Scattered Site Programs. 422 to total receive case management services.

Success Story: Jershon Young's Path to Leadership and Career Growth

Jershon Young, a recent immigrant from Belize, joined YouthBuild Charter CRCD Academy to continue his education and became involved with YouthBuild Construction and JLAG. His leadership potential was recognized when he was elected Class Lead and selected for JLAG's New Student Leadership Academy in Washington, DC. Jershon's strong communication and social skills led to his enrollment in the WIOA work experience program, where he gained valuable hands-on experience to further develop his career skills. His dedication to learning and growth continues to set him up for future success.

Ruth's Place Success: 86% of young people engaged at Ruth's Place transitioned into temporary or permanent housing, with the program seeing a **notable increase in youth participation, serving twice as many individuals as the previous year.**

Success Story: Zion's Journey from Homelessness to Aspiring Barber

Zion Hill has been a resident of La Prensa Libre Apartments since July 3, 2024, after experiencing homelessness and staying at the Tiny Home Village in Echo Park Lake since November 2023. During this time, he worked closely with his ICMS case manager to secure housing and address personal challenges. Since obtaining stable housing, Zion has developed social and life skills, gaining access to health services, benefits, and educational opportunities that were previously difficult to access while unhoused. With the support of the CRCD Housing and Supportive Services Program, he has maintained his housing and pursued his goals, including exploring employment opportunities and working toward a barber certification through the CRCD WorkSource Center. Zion is grateful for the ongoing guidance from his case manager and the resources provided by the program, which have been vital to his progress.

BUSINESS EMPOWERMENT AND FINANCIAL SERVICES

CRCD Financial Services: Empowering the Community

In 2024, CRCD provided comprehensive financial services to promote stability, growth, and financial literacy, reaching over 489 participants through 87 workshops. These workshops focused on budgeting, credit management, and banking services, empowering individuals to take control of their financial futures. Additionally, 293 participants received 1-on-1 financial counseling, including in areas like budgeting, credit assessment and banking services.



VITA Services: Supporting Foster Youth

For the third consecutive year, CRCD offered Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) with a focus on helping foster youth. In 2024, 167 tax filers were assisted, securing over \$300,000 in refunds, including access to the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) and Foster Youth Tax Credit (FYTC) for 69 individuals.

Connected to Our Community: Hispanic Heritage Month Reception

On October 15, 2024, the CRCD Southeast LA BusinessSource Center proudly participated in the Hispanic Heritage Month Business Reception, celebrating the achievements of Latino-owned businesses. The event gathered community leaders and entrepreneurs to honor their contributions.

CRCD Receives the DFPI Grant

Through the California Department of Financial Protection and Innovation Grant under Cal Money Smart we were able to provide 191 youth participants with the invaluable experience of visiting Junior Achievement Finance Park. This hands-on program exposed them to real-life financial decision-making, budgeting, and planning, helping them better understand how to apply financial concepts to their own lives. These experiences were designed to further support our youth in developing financial literacy skills and preparing them for long-term financial success.



CRCD Enterprises provides construction, maintenance, and beautification services while offering job training through programs like LA RISE, YouthBuild, and Summer Youth Employment. As a licensed contractor, it creates career opportunities and equips individuals with skills for long-term success.

Sharing Our Impact: Lead Abatement Program

During National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week, we highlighted the stories of Remy, Shi'Ann, and Tom, who were positively impacted by CRCD's lead abatement program, supported by the City of Los Angeles, Los Angeles County Department of Public Health and Los Angeles County Development Authority.

Success Story: Rainyia Hart's Journey to a New Career

Rainyia Hart, a 29-year-old mother from Baldwin Village, was ready for a career change after working as a medical assistant. She discovered her passion for lead abatement while helping schedule blood lead tests for children and decided to transition into construction. Joining CRCD Enterprises as an entry-level employee, Rainyia received support in the form of utility assistance, car insurance help, and her first set of tools and boots. Thanks to CRCD's training, she gained the confidence to pursue her new career and now feels empowered to achieve anything she sets her mind to.

Community Impact & Infrastructure Improvement

The CRCD Enterprises team delivered substantial improvements across South Los Angeles. Our team focuses on removing trash, weeds, and bulky items from alleys daily. Our efforts include graffiti abatement services. To date, we have:

- Removed over 6.8 million square feet of graffiti
- Cleared over 1,274 tons of trash
- Cleaned and repaired over 642,254 blocks of sidewalks

CRCD PARTNERS

Investing in Housing

CRCD launched CRCD Partners in 2021 to prioritize investments in South Los Angeles and collaborate with local organizations, regional developers, and stakeholders to create community-driven housing solutions aligned with the needs of South LA. By focusing on vulnerable populations, like transition-aged youth (TAY), low-income families, veterans, and seniors, CRCD Partners ensures that developments not only provide homes but also foster long-term stability, economic opportunity, and community growth.

The Vermont Homekey project is a critical housing initiative led by the Coalition for Responsible Community Development (CRCD) in collaboration with California Department of Housing and Community Development, Los Angeles Housing Department, and the \$1.5 million sponsored by Congresswoman Nanette Barragán via Housing and Urban Development.

The project has been granted \$11.9 million in total funding with the primary objective of converting the existing motel into 136 units of permanent supportive housing. The improvements will address accessibility requirements and create on-site amenities and social service areas. This project reflects CRCD's continued commitment to equitable housing solutions that address the diverse needs of Los Angeles' most vulnerable populations.

CRCD Partners: Transforming South LA

Since 2011, CRCD and CRCD Partners have driven the transformation of South Los Angeles, building on CRCD's foundation to provide pathways to opportunity through housing, jobs, and education. Through strategic investments, \$323 million has been mobilized for a total of 681 affordable housing units and infrastructure. In 2024 alone, an additional \$183 million was invested in South LA resulting in an additional 217 affordable housing units.

Evermont: Revitalizing South LA with Affordable Housing

After decades of disinvestment, the corner of Vermont and Manchester is now a place of hope. In 2024, Evermont opened in the Vermont-Slauson neighborhood, transforming a vacant site into a vibrant community asset. This project, developed through strong partnerships, brings 178 affordable housing units, a public transit plaza, retail space, and permanent supportive housing to one of South LA's most historically underserved areas. Guided by a dedicated Community Advisory Committee, Evermont is a community-first investment that also exceeded local hire and Section 3 business goals. We thank our partners, including BRIDGE Housing, Primestor, Metro, and SEED LA, for helping restore community wealth and creating opportunities for South LA residents.

Expanding Affordable Housing

By the end of 2024, CRCD Partners achieved significant housing milestones:

- Completed properties increased from 13 to 17, representing a 31% growth, and total housing units rose by 47%, from 464 to 681.
- Properties in development rose from 12 to 17 (42% growth).
- Housing units in development expanded from 1,170 to 1,750 (50% growth).

These efforts are closing the housing gap, ensuring more families, seniors, and TAY have access to stable, supportive housing.

SOUTH LOS ANGELES ALL IN

South LA All In 'Good Jobs, Healthy Communities' (SLAAI-GJHC) Initiative

CRCD marked a historic achievement with the announcement of a \$20 million EPA Community Change Grant. This investment will drive the South LA All In 'Good Jobs, Healthy Communities' (SLAAI-GJHC) Initiative, focused on environmental justice, pollution reduction, improved community health, and green job creation.



In partnership with Los Angeles Trade-Technical College, the City of Los Angeles, the County of Los Angeles, the City of Los Angeles Economic and Workforce Development Department, Los Angeles County Development Authority, Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, Amity Foundation, and Community Coalition, the initiative will provide workforce training in lead abatement, welding, electric vehicle maintenance, and weatherization. This program will equip South LA residents with the skills needed for sustainable, high-paying careers. This milestone reflects a commitment to empowering communities and fostering climate resilience in South Los Angeles.

Best Start South LA

In partnership with Rising Communities, the Best Start Region 2 initiative empowers South LA parents by addressing challenges in housing and employment. A parent-led study of over 1,100 families highlights the need for quality housing and living-wage jobs. The initiative fosters informed decision-making, community involvement, and policies that improve housing conditions and overall well-being for residents.

SLAAI Alumni Network

The South LA All In team launched the CRCD Alumni Network, engaging 63 alumni from CRCD youth programs. This network offers peer-to-peer support, mentorship, supportive services, professional development workshops, and networking events, helping alumni stay connected and celebrate their successes.

SLAAI Street Team

Street Team was created to lead community outreach and engagement efforts, focusing on key initiatives like the Office of Community Partnerships and Strategic Communications "Trusted Messenger" program, which included campaigns around extreme weather, water conservation and mental health services for youth and supported outreach and events for CRCD programs. Over 6,000 South LA residents were engaged.

Good Jobs Network

The launch of the Good Jobs Network brought together eight grassroots organizations to strengthen career pathways and workforce development in South LA. Through microgrants, the network empowered local job seekers and supported community-based nonprofits, with a strong focus on construction apprenticeship programs and job placement opportunities.

Community Table

In response to food insecurity, CRCD launched the "Community Table" at the VCN/YouthSource Center, a weekly gathering providing fresh produce and essential resources. In 2024, 1,629 households received food bags, contributing to the distribution of over 180,000 pounds (90 tons) of produce.

2024 HONORS

The Coalition for Responsible Community Development has been honored with the following recognitions:

- CRCD received the **LA Better Building Challenge Innovator of the Year Community Impact Award** for our commitment to affordable housing and community development in South LA.
- CRCD proudly received the **6-of-6 National Network Award** at the JAG 2024 National Training Seminar in recognition of outstanding performance in graduation rates, employment, and further education. 


